CHANGES TO READING AT BELGRAVE



Reading influences every aspect of our daily lives. With our reading confidence determined at an early age, effectively teaching this key skill to EYFS (Early Years Foundation Stage) children can significantly impact their future. It is universally recognised that children who read for enjoyment develop a rich vocabulary and have increased general knowledge and understanding of other cultures. Being a competent reader also supports children in accessing learning across the whole curriculum. Reading for pleasure can promote better health and wellbeing, aids in building social connections and relationships with others and is associated with a range of factors that help increase the chances of social mobility. Research shows that regularly reading to children plays a crucial part in their learning to read. Reading quality stories to children not only introduces them to a wide range of vocabulary but supports their communication and language skills. The natural conversations that arise when sharing books also develop children's understanding and comprehension skills and can foster a love of reading later in life. Phonics and reading are significantly important to embed a culture where books, vocabulary and reading take top priority. In Reception and Key Stage One short, focused, daily phonics sessions are crucial in developing these reading skills, but supporting children to become independent readers who love reading is undoubtedly our goal.

Children love to listen to stories multiple times. Once the children are familiar with a story, subsequent readings can allow time to explore vocabulary, join in with the story and develop comprehension. After sharing the story, children will have access to the book so they can read, retell and discuss the story with more independence.

We use the **Monster Phonics** programme to teach reading and phonics in our Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 classes. Sessions take place daily and are taught by staff trained specifically in the programme. We also use the **Monster Phonics Intervention** catch-up programme for children who have gaps in their phonic knowledge.

Children in EYFS, Year 1 and Year 2 will bring home at a corresponding **Monster Phonics** book each week which are closely matched to their current phonic knowledge and as such should be fully decodable. The children will have been reading the book during the week in school to aid fluency alongside embedding phonic knowledge. Children will be reading in a group each day for 15-20 minutes. The Monster Phonics book they have been reading will be

sent home on Friday to read and enjoy over the weekend. These will need to be returned on a Monday for other children to use.

The Monster Phonics books will be supplemented with a book from our reading for pleasure range, this is for the children to share with an adult or older sibling. This book will probably not be fully decodable for your child yet so the expectation is not for your child to read this book completely independently. We believe strongly that children will develop a love of reading through experiencing success when reading at home and having quality story time with a wide range of books.



In response to recent research concerning the most effective way to promote reading fluency and enjoyment, instead of small group guided reading sessions in KS2, we will have up to three whole class reading sessions each week, using extracts and articles. There will a task related to this for the children to complete at home. Some children may still read in small groups in addition to the whole class sessions.

- Reading for pleasure we will have designated sessions during the week when children will be encouraged to 'Read for Pleasure'. They will be able to choose any of the books we have here in school. These will not be banded and children will be guided to make appropriate choices. They may also bring in books from home to read in these sessions and they will be encouraged to take books home to read also.
- As ever, we will continue to read class books to the children to promote engagement with whole texts and reading enjoyment.

The best way to help your child achieve well in reading, and indeed across the curriculum, is to hear them read and share and discuss a variety of reading materials as often as you can. We urge you to *strive for five* times a week. This is to develop and embed those good reading habits that will help them to be successful in school and beyond. Throughout school, high quality books and other reading resources in the classrooms, along with special events help to inspire and motivate children to read.

When children are given regular opportunities to share their stories with adults at school and home, their language, communication and comprehension skills can naturally develop and bolster their phonics learning.

NETBALL TEAM MAKE IT TO COUNTY FINALS
